We'll discuss why to compost with worms, worm biology and habitat, what kind of bin to use, good places for worm bins, how to maintain and troubleshoot your worm bin, how to harvest vermicompost, and what to do with the finished compost.

Container Gardening: A How-To Guide

Container gardening is the practice of growing plants in containers instead of in the ground. After this presentation we hope that attendees will know how to design and care for a container garden, feel more confident in designing, starting and maintaining a container garden and be ready to plant a container garden.

Rain Gardening

A rain garden is a bowl-shaped garden designed to absorb excess rainwater run-off from a house and its associated landscape. Learn how having a rain garden benefits the environment, how to make one and what plants are suitable.

Sustainable Lawn Care

Create a healthy lawn using fewer inputs like water, fertilizer and time, while still having a positive impact on the environment

VEGETABLE GARDENING

Your First Vegetable Garden

Get your garden off to a smart start. Learn the basic information you need to become a more successful vegetable gardeners. You will learn some common terminology; where to locate your garden; selecting cool and warm weather vegetables to grow; whether to direct seed or select transplants; how to minimize insect damage and soil diseases without using chemicals; types of traditional and creative gardens to consider; the basic tools you will need; how to use companion, successive, and succession planning to extend your harvest; and some practical ways to control animals and weeds.

Square Foot Vegetable Gardening

Led by Extension Master Gardener Volunteers – Hennepin County, learn the basics of this exciting new trend.

Advanced Vegetable Gardening

You will learn how to create a simple multi-year rotational plan to minimize diseases and insect damage; how to extend your season in the spring and fall; the no-till method for weed-free gardening; when and how to use different mulches and the benefits of each; best practices for organic gardening; when and how to use organic and chemical fertilizers; how to attract beneficial insects to your garden; how to amend your garden soil; saving seeds from your favorite veggies; and how to make and use compost the easy way.

Water Wisely: Healthy Plants, Healthy People, Healthy Planet.

People who care for a yard or garden can help protect water resources by being wise about watering practices, starting in their own backyards. This one-hour class covers recommended watering practices for gardens, lawns, and trees and shrubs. Master Gardeners can also present partial sessions of the class covering just one of these three watering areas.
